## ELEVENTH MONTHLY CONFERENCE OF SENIOR OFFICERS.

GENERAL DISCUSSION RE APPOINTMENTS OF WORMEN TO STAFF:-A general discussion, in which all officers took peri took place concerning the position that was arising owing to the lack of applicantions from men for positions advertised by the Council in this Division and the demand that could not be filled by men.

There was general agreement that there were already enough women in the Division. The following points were

emphasized: -

(1) Women frequently left the service to get matried, just when they were becoming most useful and thus heavy outlay on training them was to a large extent wasted.

(2) If a woman stayed on, if often happened that she lost instead of gained in power and ability as she approached

her fiftieth year.

(3) Once a woman became a Senior, men are extremely unwilling to serve under her as a Junior, and so there is a danger of that Section passing for all time under the domination of women. A case in point was quoted in a scientific institution which had resulted in the permanent

weakening of a whole Division in this manner.
(4) Though there were occasional exceptional women who could be sent into the field alone to work, or to accompany a Senior man in the field, generally such pro-

ceedings were undesirable.
